Lonesome Traveler: the songs of Lee Hays, Pete Seeger and Woody Guthrie









On Sunday, January 22 at 3 p.m., the Annual Jean Ritchie Folk Concert will feature Ira Perlman and Denise Romas presenting "Lonesome Traveler," a musical narrative featuring the songs of iconic folk singers Lee Hays, Woody Guthrie and Pete Seeger.

Hays, Guthrie and Seeger performed together with The Almanac Singers and left bodies of work that have influenced generations of musicians. Perlman and Romas will



perform such classic songs as "Union Maid," "Talking Union Blues," "Lonesome Traveler" and "If I had a Hammer."

Ira Perlman has appeared at numerous Long Island folk venues performing both well-known and obscure folk songs. He is a past president of the Folk Music Society of Huntington.

Denise Romas got her first guitar at age 11, and immersed herself in the music of Peter, Paul and Mary

and Joan Baez. She performs at venues across Long Island.

Born and raised in the eastern Kentucky mountains, Jean Ritchie (1922-2015) grew up singing the old music brought over by her ancestors from Scotland, Ireland and England. Trained at the University of Kentucky as a social worker, she came to New York in 1947 for her first job at the Henry Street Settlement on the Lower East Side of Manhattan.

Ritchie preferred to sing without instrumental accompaniment, but occasionally accompanied herself on autoharp, guitar and handmade plucked lap or mountain dulcimer. Over the years, her name became synonymous with Appalachian music. She recorded thirty albums and wrote seven books. Ritchie lived with her family in Port Washington for many years, and was a long-time member of the Library's Music Advisory Council. Each year we celebrate her legacy with a folk concert held in her honor.

On Wednesday, January 25 at 7 p.m., author, columnist and Port resident George Vecsey will join host Randy Cohen to discuss his career and his favorite person, place and thing. The interview will appear on a future installment of Cohen's podcast Person Place Thing. Guitarist Bennett Harris will provide musical interludes throughout the evening.

Vecsey, a sports columnist at The New York Times from 1982 through 2011, has written about such events as the FIFA World Cup and the Olympics, and on a wide variety of sports including tennis, football, basketball, hockey, soccer and boxing. Baseball, the sport he's covered since 1960, is his favorite.


He has written and contributed to more than a dozen books on sports and other topics, including Baseball: A History of America's Favorite Game and Loretta Lynn:

Coal Miner's Daughter (with country singer Loretta Lynn), which was made into an Academy Award-winning film. Vecsey has also served as a national and religion reporter for The New York Times, interviewing the Dalai Lama, former British prime minister Tony Blair, evangelist Billy Graham, and a host of other noteworthy figures.

In addition to assisting Loretta Lynn, Vecsey has helped several other high-profile figures write their autobiographies, including country singer Barbara Mandrell and Chinese human rights activist Harry Wu. His work in this field has ranged from cowriting to consulting.

at the Battle of Long Island in 1776 and how some Long Islanders fought back while living under occupation. Grasso will focus on the role that Long Island Sound and other bodies of water played during this conflict, including daring boat raids carried out across the Sound.

Dr. Grasso is an Adjunct Assistant Professor of History and Political Science at Queensborough Community College. She specializes in the American Revolution.

Landscapes by Syd Glasser

From January 3 through 30, visit the Karen and Ed Adler Gallery to enjoy a new exhibit by Brooklyn artist Syd Glasser. Also join the artist at a reception on Saturday, January 9 from 2 to 4 p.m.

Glasser holds a BA in print-making from SUNY Binghamton. Shortly after leaving Binghamton, she moved to Brooklyn, where her Sunset Park studio has become a place of solace and meditation. Often combining the beauty she finds in urban and architectural decay with images of figures, horses and landscape, her process blurs the lines between abstract and representation.

For Glasser, art is about the process and experimentation. A recent excursion to Iceland brought her new views of the world—landscapes created by volcanic eruptions and melting glaciers were like living collages. She returned to New York inspired and renewed, and began her first series of landscape images.

Glasser has shown her work in galleries throughout Brooklyn and Manhattan, and has received several awards from SUNY Bing-



hamton for her work in monotype and mixed media. She currently maintains a chashama studio residency at the Brooklyn Army Terminal.


