



In *The Undulating Unknown*, Christina Massey explores the tension between intellectual understanding and emotional responses to climate change. Through sculptural paintings, glass sculptures, and photography, she reflects on nature's beauty and fragility. Her work combines aluminum cans and mixed-media glass, symbolizing both nature's resilience and human impact. Photographs of these sculptures in natural landscapes during the pandemic highlight the tension between intrusion and harmony. Known for repurposing materials like beer cans, Massey creates vibrant botanical abstractions across various mediums.

In the Library Parking Lot

Got outdated electronics or metal cluttering your space? Arrow Scrap Metal and E-waste Recycling will be at our parking lot to collect your unwanted items for proper recycling. Bring in used computers, phones, laptops, servers, scrap metal, circuit boards, batteries, small appliances, electronics, and more for secure collection. For paper shredding, please limit it to three boxes to ensure space in the truck. Not accepted: lightbulbs, liquids, paints, gas containers, medical waste, tires, paper, glass, wood, alkaline batteries, or general garbage. For shredding, remove X-rays, plastic binders, plastic sleeves, large binder clips, hardcover books, 3-4 ring binders, batteries, electronics, or wet paper to avoid jams.


The Ladies From Your Past Exhibit


Ella Fitzgerald
