Black History Month at PWPL

An exploration of the folk portraits by Joshua Johnson, the earliest known professional Black painter.

Sandwiched In with Ron Brown: Madam C.J. Walker, First Female Self-Made Millionaire Friday, February 9 at 12:00 p.m. in Lapham Meeting Room



Recognized as the first female self-made millionaire in America, Madam C.J. Walker pioneered her own brand of cosmetics and hair care products for African American women in the Midwest. By 1913, she was a successful businesswoman and moved her operation to Harlem. She supported African American philanthropic organizations, universities, and artists and remains one of the business success stories of the Harlem Renaissance.

Sandwiched In with Dennis Raverty: **Edmonia "Wildfire" Lewis and Henry Ossawa Tanner** Friday, February 23 at 12:00 p.m. in Lapham Meeting Room

Examine the lives and work of sculptor Edmonia Lewis and painter Henry Ossawa Tanner. Both of these artists relocated to Europe permanently to pursue their artistic careers. This presentation will examine sacred themes and the exploration of black identity in their work.



Art Lecture with Thomas Germano: The Harlem Renaissance and Transatlantic Modernism

Explore a new exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art showcasing multimedia works by Black artists. Their work depicts daily life in growing cities like NYC's Harlem and others across the United States during the 1920s-40s, the early decades of the Great Migration when millions of African Americans left the segregated South.

PWPL has several Assistive Listening Devices that can be used in our Lapham Meeting Room during events. These devices will help provide more



Thursday, February 8 at 7:00 p.m. in Lapham Meeting Room






The Fraud by Zadie Smith
