We are happy to formally announce The Port Washington Public Library will not be charging overdue late fines for any circulating materials moving forward.

In a message from Keith Klang, Library Director, he stated, "Beginning in 2022, overdue fines will be permanently eliminated at the Library. We are not alone in making this permanent change as several Libraries on Long Island, in New York City, and around the country have done the same.

Eliminating overdue fines reduces barriers, makes our Library more accessible for all and actually increases the number of materials coming back to the Library for others to enjoy."

What Does This Mean?

- Patrons are still responsible for returning or renewing items they check out on or before the due date.
- Borrowing privileges may be suspended for patrons until a replacement fee has been paid or the overdue material(s) have been returned.

FOL University: Dr. Merve Emre on "The Responsibilities of the Literary Critic"

University of Oxford English professor and 2003 Schreiber H.S. graduate

Sunday, January 23 at 1:30 p.m. on Zoom



What is the function of criticism at the present time? What, if any, are the responsibilities of the critic? To begin to answer these questions, this talk draws on the writings of exemplary literary critics of the past—T.S. Eliot, Virginia Woolf, Edmund Wilson, Elizabeth Hardwick—to map a future for criticism. It stresses the importance of judgment and justification, aesthetics and politics, and finally, the interrelation between life and literature.

These questions will be explored by Professor Emre as part of the Friends of the Library's popular FOL University series. Dr. Emre, who received a B.A. from Harvard and a Ph.D from Yale, is the author of *The Annotated Mrs. Dalloway* (2021), *Paraliterary: The Making of Bad Readers in Postwar America* (2017), *The Ferrante Letters* (2019), and *The Personality Brokers* (2018), which was selected as one of the best books of 2018 by the *New York Times*. She is also a highly regarded literary critic with reviews appearing in *The New York Review of Books*, *The Atlantic*, and other publications. In 2022, she will serve as one of the judges of the International Booker Prize.

Ring in the New Year with a New Museum Pass – Raynham Hall in Oyster Bay



Raynham Hall, in Oyster Bay, was the home of Robert Townsend, one of George Washington's most trusted spies during the American Revolution. The 20-room homestead, which has been converted into a museum, offers a vivid look at nearly three centuries of history and sends visitors back to the days of the Founding Fathers and the Culper Spy Ring. Raynham Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and is purportedly haunted (see lihauntedhouses.com). Located at 20 West Main Street, Oyster Bay. 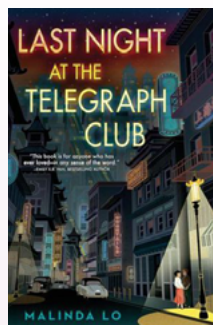
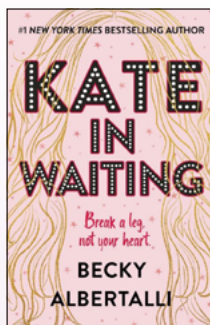

“Concrete Rose” by Angie Thomas

A gang leader's son finds his effort to go straight for the sake of his child challenged by a loved one's brutal murder, in a poignant exploration of Black coming-of-age set seventeen years before the events of the award-winning book, *The Hate U Give*.

“Instructions for Dancing” by Nicola Yoon

After witnessing a couple kiss Yvette thinks of how their romance will end in heartbreak, then while taking dance lessons she starts to fall for an adventurous boy, and she starts to question all she thought she knew about love.

“The Light of Days: The Untold Story of Women Resistance Fighters in Hitler's Ghettos” by Judy Batalion with Winifred Conkling

Presents the untold story of the young Jewish women who became resistance fighters against the Nazis during World War II.

“Nubia: Real One” by L.L. McKinney

Nubia has always stood out because of her Amazonian strength, but even though she uses her ability for good she is seen as a threat, so when her best friend Quisha is threatened by a boy who thinks he owns the town, Nubia risks everything to become the hero society tells her she is not.

“The Girl from the Sea” by Molly Knox Ostertag

Morgan has a secret. She can't wait to escape the perfect little island where she lives. She's desperate to finish high school and escape her family and friends. Morgan's biggest secret is that she wants to kiss another girl. One night, Morgan is saved from drowning by a mysterious girl named Keltie. The two become friends but Keltie has some secrets of her own. As the girls fall in love, everything they're each trying to hide will find its way to the surface, whether Morgan is ready or not.
