

## Library Foundation hosts Tenth Inspiration Gala

On Saturday, September 28, the Port Washington Library Foundation will host its Tenth Inspiration Gala, celebrating “The Jewel of Port Washington . . . our Library.” This year, the Foundation has three outstanding honorees: National Grid (with National Grid New York President Kenneth D. Daly accepting); Lucy Mazany, senior vice president and Long Island Division manager of Valley National Bank; and Georgia DeYoung.

National Grid — Long Island’s natural gas company — will receive The Corporate Leadership Award. National Grid is the largest distributor of natural gas in the northeast-

ern U.S., serving 3.4 million customers and also delivering electricity to approximately 3.3 million customers in upstate New York, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island.

Kenneth D. Daly, President of National Grid New York, will accept the award. Throughout his 25-year career, Mr. Daly has held numerous positions, including Group Financial Controller based in London; CFO, Global Gas Distribution; and Vice President of Financial and Employee Related Services. Mr. Daly earned a bachelor’s degree from St. Francis College and master’s degrees from both St. John’s University and New York University, and also achieved

the distinguished Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) designation. He is a member of the St. Francis College Board of Directors and has been the Director of the St. John’s University Executive-in-Residence Program since 1992. He is also a graduate of the David Rockefeller Fellows Program and a member of the Long Island Energiea Partnership and the British American Business Council Board of Directors.

## Library Foundation receives two new grants for “Books for Dessert” reading club

The Port Washington Library Foundation is pleased to announce the receipt of a \$5000 grant from the Angela and Scott Jaggar Foundation for the library’s “Books for Dessert” program, an innovative book club that helps adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities read and discuss books.

Every week at the library, groups gather to read a good story under the direction of trained leaders, meet new friends, and learn while having fun (and dessert!).

Angela Jaggar, a retired professor of literacy at New York University, will help the library develop an evaluation process so crucial to obtaining further support. The Library is also grateful to the Pine Tree Foundation of New York for

their \$10,000 grant providing funds to continue the program next year.

The program’s goal is to provide services to an underserved population — people who have “aged out” of the school system and have little, if any, opportunity to enjoy the advantages of a library or even to read on a regular basis. The program is designed to increase their reading abilities and teach life skills while enhancing the pleasure of reading.

“Books for Dessert” is the first such program ever awarded an Adult Literacy Services Grant by the New York State Library division of the New York State Education Department, and is one of the few of its kind in the country.

She is a past president of the Community Synagogue, and past vice president of the Greater NY Council of Reform Synagogues and a national board member of the Union for Reform Judaism. She co-chaired the Synagogue’s 50<sup>th</sup> and 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebrations, and is currently on its Sanctuary Renovation Design Committee.

When Becky Aikman had to remake her life, she gathered five other young widows like herself and took a forthright approach to finding happiness again. Armed with up-to-date research, they rejected the now discredited five stages of grief and substituted laughter, adventure, friendship and a healthy interest in, yes, love. Important, insightful and often humorous, Aikman’s *Saturday Night Widows: The Adventures of Six Friends Remaking Their Lives* (Random House, 2013) offers a distinctive take on a largely under-covered but universal topic — starting over after losing someone close to you. An unsentimental, witty, and totally involving chronicle of moving on, Aikman’s book reads like a novel yet demonstrates important, little known principles about resilience in the face of tragedy. 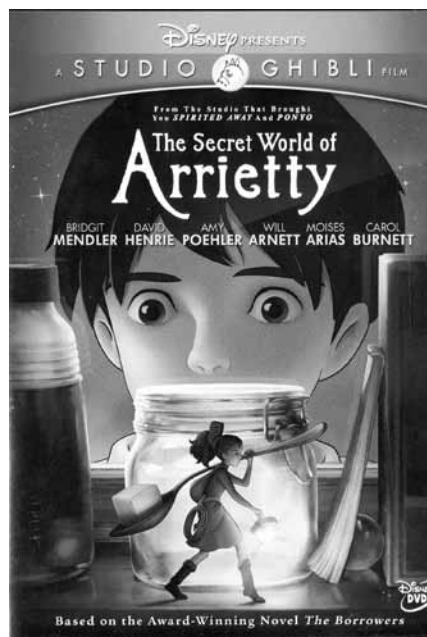

This month we present programs that take us to L. Frank Baum's Oz and to Lewis Carroll's Wonderland. Our circulating DVD collection offers dozens of fantasy movies, including these recent releases:

*The Last Airbender* (2010). Aang (Noah Ringer), a young successor to a long line of Avatars, must put his childhood ways aside and stop the Fire Nation from enslaving the Water, Earth and Air nations. M. Night Shyamalan scripted, produced and directed.

*Mirror Mirror* (2012) by Tarsem Singh. When an evil queen (Julia Roberts) steals control of a kingdom, an exiled princess (Lily Collins) enlists the help of seven resourceful rebels to win back her birthright.

*The Odd Life of Timothy Green* (2012). Childless couple Cindy and Jim Green (Jennifer Garner, Joel Edgerton) bury in their backyard a box containing all of their wishes for an infant. Soon, magically, the child Timothy (CJ Adams) is born. Director Peter Hedget also scripted.

*Percy Jackson & the Olympians: The Lightning Thief* (2010). When his lightning bolt is stolen, Zeus (Sean Bean) accuses Percy Jackson (Logan Lerman), a human teenager

with dyslexia and ADHD. Chris Columbus produced and directed.

*Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time* (2010). Rogue Prince Dastan (Jake Gyllenhaal) reluctantly teams up with rival Princess Tamina (Gemma Arterton) to safeguard a magical dagger. A Mike Newell film.

*Ruby Sparks* (2012). Calvin Weir-Fields (Paul Dano), a novelist struggling with writer's block, starts writing a novel about his feminine ideal, a character named Ruby Sparks, only to find that he has willed her into existence. Zoe Kazan, who plays the title role, also scripted for directors Jonathan Dayton and Valerie Faris.

*The Secret World of Arrietty* (2010). The Clock family are tiny people who live anonymously in another family's residence, borrowing simple items to make their home. Life changes for the Clocks when their daughter, Arrietty, is discovered by the humans. A cartoon by Hiromasa Yonebayashi.

*Snow White and the Huntsman* (2012). In Rupert Sanders's twist on the classic fairy tale, the huntsman (Chris Hemsworth) ordered to kill Snow White (Kristen Stewart) winds up becoming her protector and mentor in a quest to vanquish evil Queen Ravenna (Charlize Theron).

*Thor* (2011). The powerful but arrogant warrior Thor (Chris Hemsworth) is cast out of the fantastic realm of Asgard and sent to live amongst humans on Earth, where he soon becomes one of their finest defenders. A Kenneth Branagh picture.

*Time Traveler: The Girl Who Leapt Through Time* (2010) by Masaaki Taniguchi. After Kazuko Yoshiyama (Narumi Yasuda) is injured in a car accident, her daughter Akari (Riisa Naka) travels back through time to 1972 in search of a mystery man from her mother's past.

*Toonpur Ka Superrhero* (2010). Film superstar Aditya (Ajay Devgan) gets the opportunity to redeem himself in his children's eyes when he finds himself in Toonpur, the land of his kids' favorite cartoons, where he must fight the bad toons (Toonsaurs) to save the good toons (Devtoons). Kireet Khurana's Bollywood musical movie combines live action with animation.

*Troll Hunter (Trolljegeren)* (2010). When film students tracks down a mysterious hunter (Otto Jespersen), they learn that he is actually hunting giant trolls. Director Andre Ovredal scripted this Norwegian fantasy with Havard S. Johansen.
